Uniform

We understand that it can be difficult to keep your children in uniform that fits them as they grow so quickly! We have noticed a growing number of children attending school in incorrect uniform and wanted to positively support children to have the correct clothing for both regular school and for PE days.

We recognise that uniform can be expensive. We have a huge supply of decent, good quality, used uniform that families can take. We welcome donations for this which would go to the PTA, but you do not have to make a donation at all if you do not wish to. We also welcome good quality, undamaged, clothing which might be of use to other children.

Items of clothing which are not part of the school uniform must not be worn for school, including on PE days. The PE kit consists of plain blue, black or white (no football shirts or logos) T-shirt, shorts, socks with trainers for outdoor wear. In colder weather children can either wear their school jumper or a **plain** blue, black or grey hoodie or zip up along with leggings or tracksuit bottoms.

Anti Racism

It is important to recognise that racism happens in society both between people and at a systemic level. At Avenues, we accept this fact and are committed to do something about it. This means we work hard to have quite difficult conversations about where racism exists, including in school, to try to plan forward for a better future.

This is not to say that racism occurs more in our school than others, but we are working to call it out! Our children, staff and wider community are passionate about this. We were so very proud of Alina Bia Jalo, Ada Tebboth and Winston Folliard, all in Year 6, who went to the UEA with Miss Agnew to give a lecture to trainee teachers about our work around being a School of Sanctuary and what we are trying to do to promote equality in all of its forms. They were very brave to speak in front of so many people and did a fantastic job!

This complimented our work on Wear Red (Show Racism the Red Card) Day where children started to consider a definition of racism and look at scenarios in relation to this.

We continue to work with a working group of parents and carers who are meeting with teaching staff on Monday 12th December where the aim is to further develop our understanding of the definition of racism so that we can share this with you in 2023.

Anti-Bullying Workshops

We do lots of work with the children about what bullying is and what bullying isn't, to ensure that they speak up when they feel someone is being targeted. We are also conscious that we perhaps haven't done as much work with our parents and carers about this and would like to invite you in for an informal coffee morning workshop to look at the school's definition of bullying and our policy for responding to this.

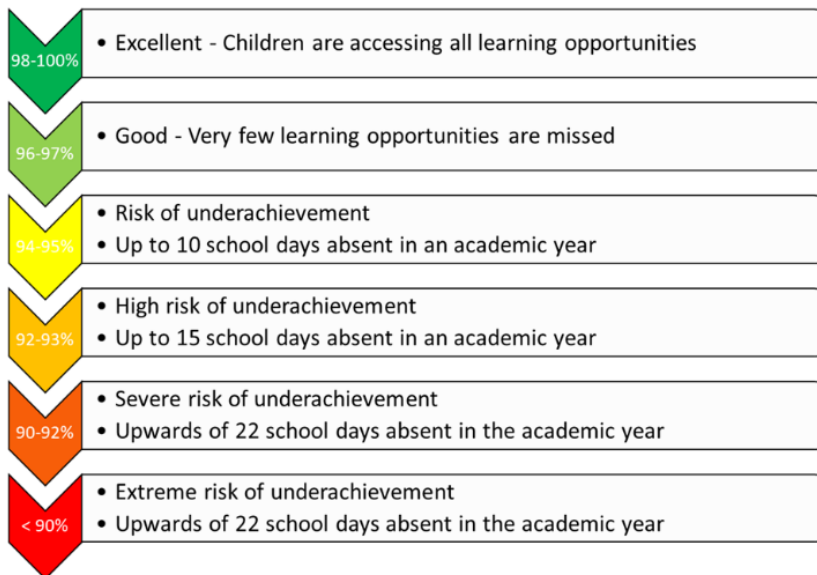
Christmas Charities

We have worked with our school's council this year to identify 2 charities to support and collect for at our Christmas Carol Concerts. The first is Nelson's Journey—they provide invaluable support to children and young people who have experienced the death of a significant person in their lives. Bereavement has very sadly affected a number of our families in our school community over the past few years and Nelson's Journey have been brilliant in providing support for both the families and school. The second charity is St Martins who provide support for the homeless in Norwich in Norfolk. They provide shelter and support for rough sleepers, help provide individuals with the skills to be successful in life and accommodate people with complex needs.

Sugar For Shelters—We have been collecting sugar again this year in support of Sugar for Shelters. This wonderful East Anglian charity help to support many homeless shelters and food kitchens during the winter period. There has been an amazing response to this charity appeal and we have collected in excess of 150kg of sugar! Much of this is produced by British Sugar (Silver Spoon) and they have pledged to match all donations of their products!

Attendance and Late Arrivals

Is your child entitled to free school meals?

If you receive one of the following, then your child may be eligible: Universal Credit, Income Support, Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income-related Employment and Support Allowance, Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999, The guaranteed element of Pension Credit, Working Tax Credit run-on or Child Tax Credit

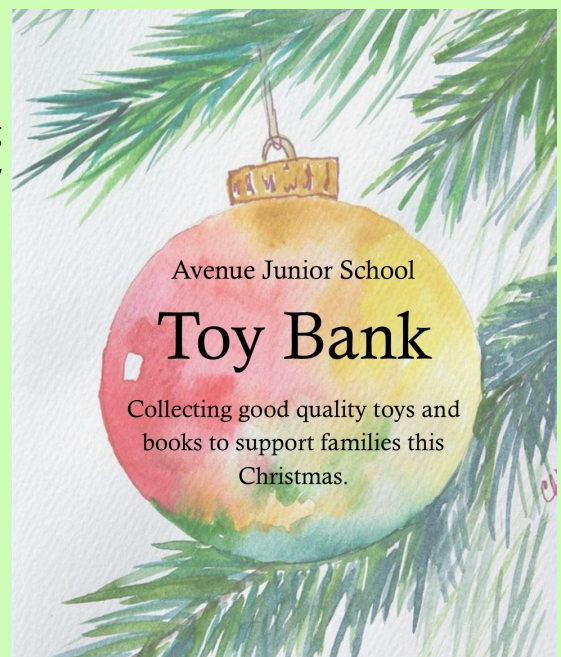
