Year 4 Summer 1:

The Vikings: were they vicious or virtuous?

What we're reading: Viking Boy by Tony Bradman

Gunnar is the son of a Viking chieftain, living peacefully on his family steading with his mother, father and their people – until they are raided by Skuli and his Wolf Men, who raze his home to the ground and take his father's life. Gunnar swears an oath to avenge his father's death and save his mother from Skuli – but first he must run to save himself.

This is a great story that immerses us into Viking life and some of the struggles the people may have bene through!

What we're writing:

A persuasive letter. An explanation text.

Humanities: History, Geography, Art, Modern Foreign Languages, RE, Music, RSHE

As Historians, we will learn about how and where the Vikings settled in Great Britain, how they lived, fought and how they co-existed with the Anglo-Saxons.

As Geographers, we will be using the points of a compass to describe which areas of Britain were settled in by the Vikings, as well as the natural features of the land which made it desirable for invasion.

As Artists, we will be exploring the dragon figure-heads that the Vikings carved on the front of their longships to instill fear in their enemies.

In PSHE, our focus will be on mental wellbeing and water safety.

As Linguists, we will continue to use Language Angels and learn through games and songs, as well as focussing on linguistic structures.

As Musicians, we will be learning about the different musical families and how these work together to form an orchestra. We will learn how these instruments create a sound.

RE Enquiry: Why is there so much diversity of belief within Christianity?

We will be exploring the differences between religion and belief. We will also look at the ways in which Christianity is practiced locally, nationally and globally.

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As Mathematicians, we will be exploring decimals and how they link to fractions. We will find examples of how decimals are used in every day life such as when measuring distance using a ruler or when timing a race – this is particularly relevent with the upcoming Olympics!

We will compare and order decimals, round them to the nearest whole number, as well as multiply and divide them by 10 and 100.

As Computer Scientists, we will be looking at the concept of repetition in programming using Scratch as a platform for this.



Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM): Computing, Design Technology, Maths, PE, Science

As Scientists, we will we exploring the human digestive system and the role that teeth and the different organs play as part of this. We will also learn about food chains and food webs within the animal kingdom.

As Engineers, we will be designing and making Viking Long Boats from clay then painting them and the sails in our own, original Viking-inspired designs.



As Sportspeople, we will develop and apply reaction and response skills and floor work balances through focused skill development sessions, healthy competition, cooperative games and group Personal Best challenges

STEM Vocabulary	Definition
Numbers	Numbers are made up of digits and have a 'value'
Digits	Digits are the symbols by which a number is represented
Integer	A number that is not a fraction
Decimal	A number relating to a system of numbers and arithmetic based on the number ten, tenth parts, and powers of ten

Optional Activities:

Whilst we don't set any formal homework at Avenue Junior School, we are passionate about reading and therefore ask that your child reads for at least 10 minutes a day. The benefits of this are wide ranging and can be felt across the curriculum. The children can take their library books home with them to read, but they must bring them in to school each day!

It can sometimes be nice to do some additional activities at home linked to our work in school and so below, we've given a few suggestions of activities you might like to try:

- Design and build your own Viking Longboat from different materials, such as wood, sticks, leaves, reeds, strawetc!
- Look at a map of the world and discuss with your child places you have been or would like to visit. Where would they like to visit and why?
- Use a map of Norwich to locate your house and the school. Can your child follow their route to school on the map? This could be an OS map of the local area or using and online mapping service such as Google Maps.
- Design and make some colourful and creative posters to help practise and remember your times tables.
- Practise calculating with money when you're out and about shopping, or cooking!
